



































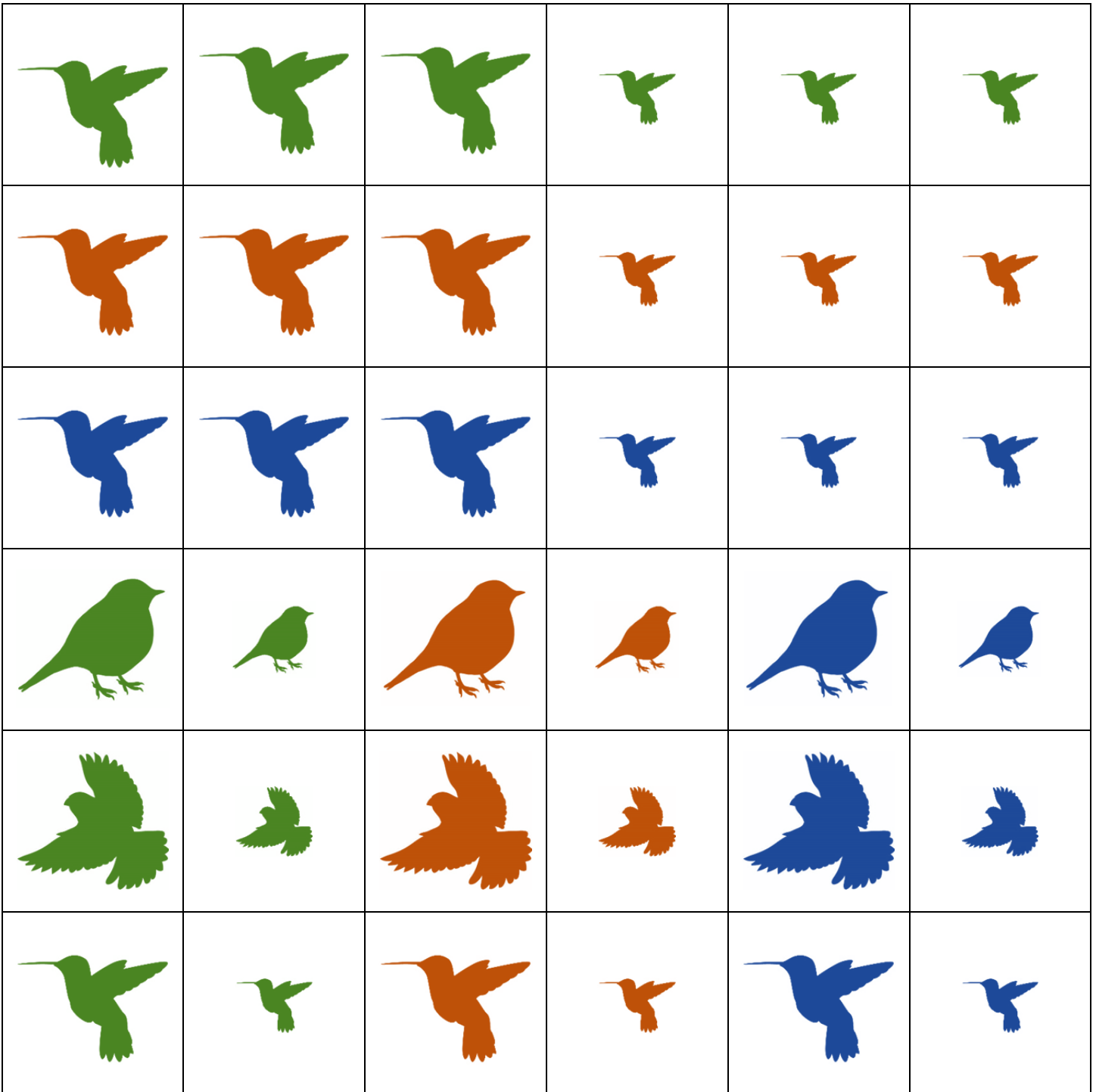




# KinderPrep Supplemental Pattern Activity

Cut out the squares. Make an AB pattern. Have your child copy the pattern and add to it. Make other AB patterns, then ABB, ABC, or other type patterns to have your child add to. Ask your child to create an AB pattern or other patterns.



It is easier to do patterns when only one attribute changes, such as **big** flying blue bird - **small** flying blue bird.

For more challenging patterns, only have one attribute stay the same such as green, blue, green blue – it wouldn't matter which bird or which size. Or big, small, big, small – in this case any bird or color could be used.
